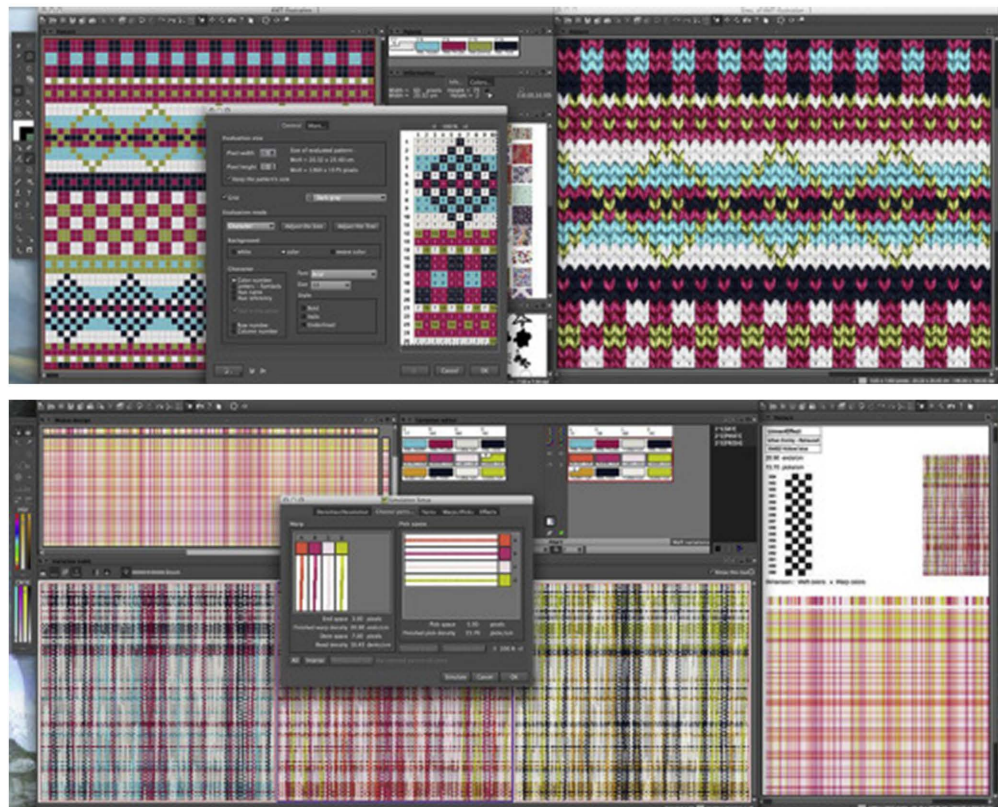


**Figure 3.** Digital printing technology in the textile handicraft sector.

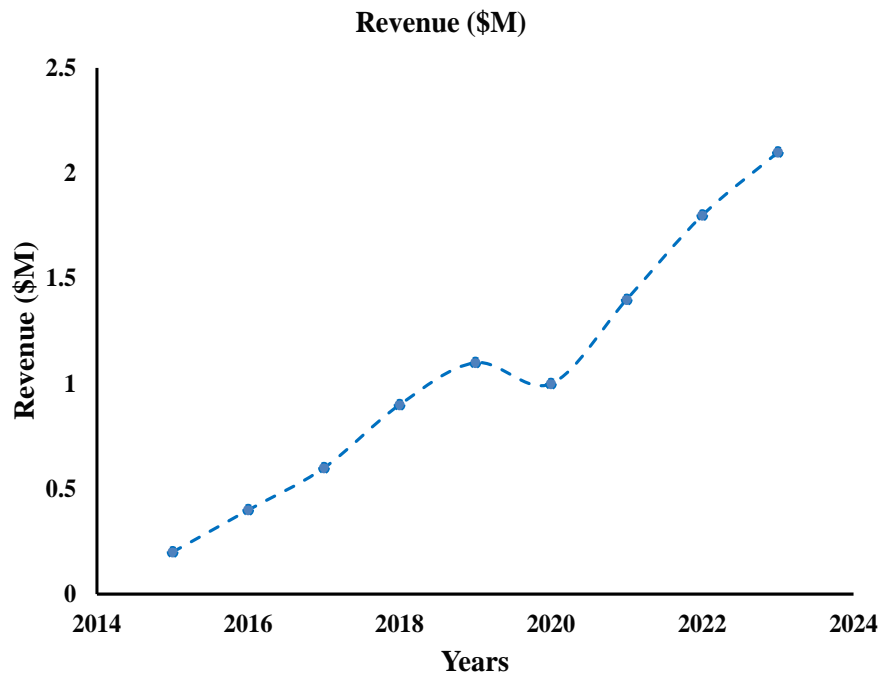
#### **Data Analysis:**

### **Sadu Project**

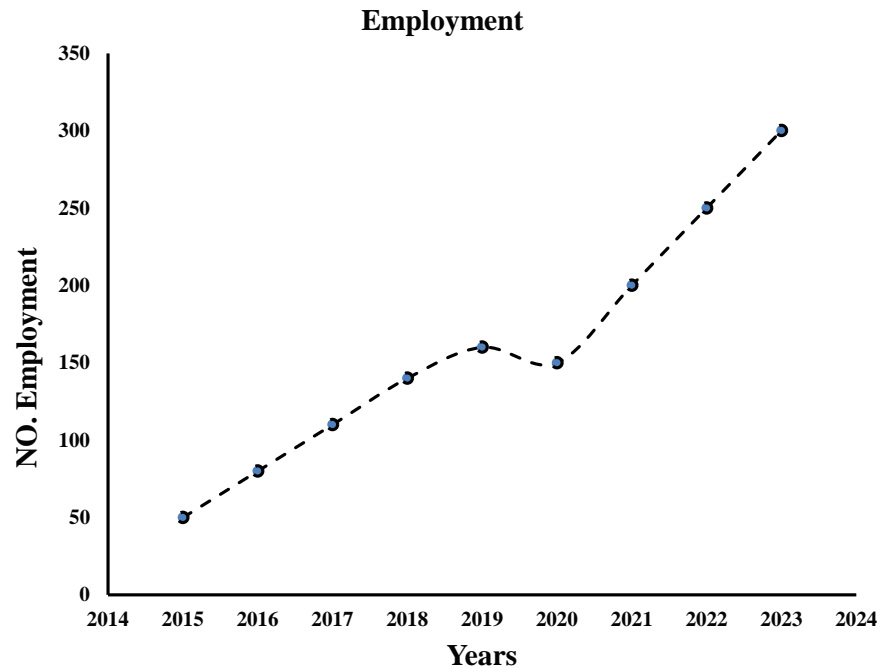

### 6.3. Comparative Analysis with International Examples

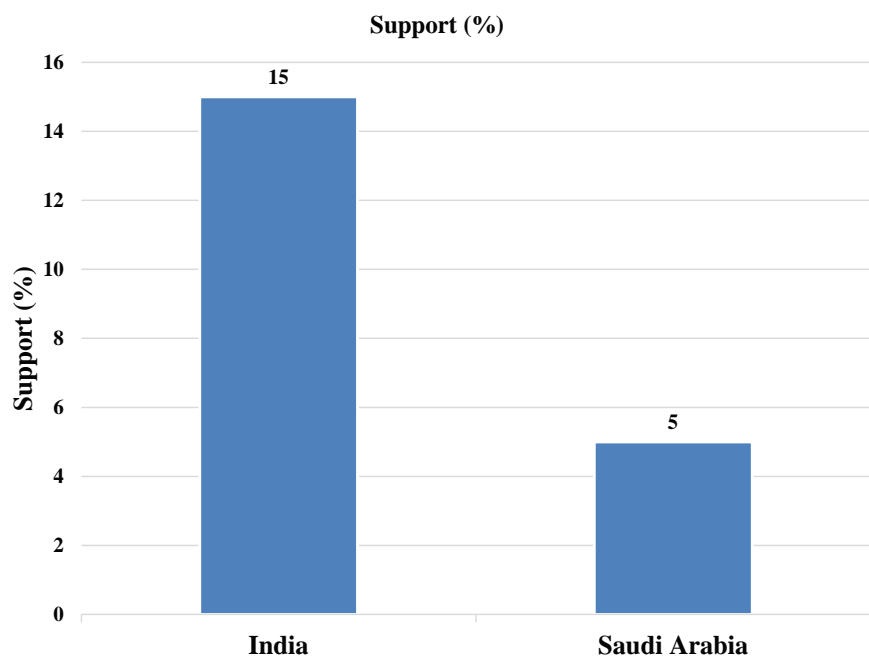
#### Indian Handloom Industry

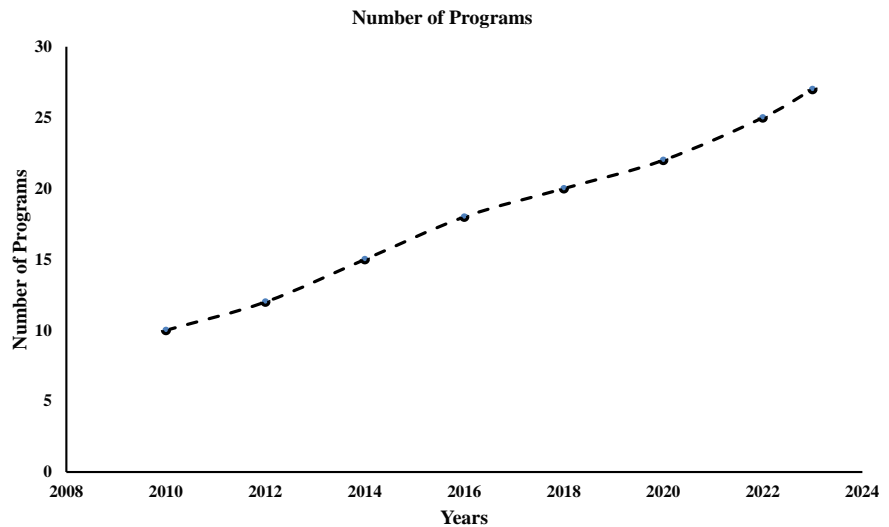
**Figure 8.** Comparison of government support for handicraft initiatives in India and Saudi Arabia.
